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EDITORIAL COMMENT

Fortunately, this lack of material has been more than offset by the quality of the submissions seen in this issue. I'm thinking, in particular, of César A. Zapata Lozada and Lisa Buttigieg LiGreci's articles.

César grew up in Bayamón, Puerto Rico and from a young age has been interested in the history of that island and its ancestors in the southwestern part of Puerto Rico. As a hobby, he does historical and genealogical research in various ecclesiastical and historical archives of Puerto Rico. He has focused on reconstructing the genealogy of many families in that part of Puerto Rico and understanding the historical context in which they lived. César's very well written account of Salvatore Cachia (see pages 11-14), another 18th century Maltese immigrant to Puerto Rico, has evolved from his meticulous research.

As for Lisa's efforts, Mona Vella-Nicholas writes: "Lisa Buttigieg-Li-Greci should be commended on her excellent recipe contributions to this newsletter. First, her choice of recipes is very typically Maltese. I love the fact that she gives a historical background at the beginning of each contribution. 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GLEANINGS FROM THE SUNDAY BULLETIN

PASTOR'S THOUGHTS...



Fr. Mario Micallef, MSSP, is pastor of St. Paul the Apostle, Toronto, the only Maltese national parish in North America. These "Pastor's thoughts..." are extracts from his commentaries on the Sunday readings which are published in the Parish's Sunday Bulletin.

This is Faith

....How often have we thought that faith is a matter of dos and don'ts? How often have we been made to believe that faith is a burden, rather than joy? In Jesus' present, Peter discovers that it is good. Faith is beautiful!

....In his foretelling, Jesus could not speak of death without making reference to the resurrection. And his oncoming death would not have made any sense without the resurrection. It is one whole event, and in the moment of darkness the disciple of Christ must remember that there is always light and life waiting. and yet, talk of resurrection does not in any way deny the reality of suffering.

There are always moments of darkness to be lived in our lives, moments that challenge our faith which is very often taken for granted. As I write these reflections, I share the pain of many people who, in different ways, are going through darkness and suffering, in particular during this time of pandemic. I constantly witness stories of people who are going through darkness in their own lives: violence, failed marriages, death in the family, unexpected illnesses, etc. It a very easy to get disheartened in moments like this. It is very normal to start asking questions and, where faith had previously seemed so solid, now it might feel very fragile and shaky.

As we journey through our own desert during this Lent, let us really listen to that voice saying: "This is my Son...listen to him!" Let us set aside some time in our day to reflect on God's word, perhaps the daily reading, given that we cannot attend church yet. And as we listen, we start experiencing what Peter did in that short moment: it is good to be here. Let us really enjoy the beauty of his present, of his word. Because without beauty, our soul dies.

Prayer Is Always Important in Our Lives

We are living out our Lent, once more, in the shadows of a pandemic. We miss the things which we used to do in normal times - the various Lenten celebrations, the prayers together, the Lenten missions, and other things which we used to take for granted. Many of us are now praying from home, probably following liturgical celebrations on TV or the internet. The desert image which we encountered in our first Sunday is very apt in these circumstances. A lot of things which are readily available in our everyday life are nowhere to be found in the desert. In this gospel Jesus depended solely on the angels, who waited on him, to be able to survive. We have also been invited to go up on the mountain of Transfiguration. Those who have been mountain-climbing know that you do not go there burdened by unnecessary stuff. Only what is really essential....

Prayer is always important in our life. During Lent we are encouraged to take it a lot more seriously. Today Jesus would like to help us understand what prayer is ready all about. It is not a commercial transaction or bargain. It is an encounter with him, who is the temple. It is an encounter with the one whom God the Father addressed as "the Beloved" upon the Transfiguration mountain.

Finally, let us not forget that, now we are the body of Christ in our world. We, disciples of Jesus, are the temple where the Beloved is present....

During this pandemic we have been forced to stay away from the brick and mortar temple. But the living temple, Jesus, who is found in each of my brothers and sisters, is never far from us. Indeed, the Covid desert is helping us discover what is truly essential in our life.

Who Is God for Us?

As we move on in our Lenten journey, it would be a good idea to think about our own idea of who God is. Like Nicodemus [Jn. 3], let us make sure to find some quiet, personal time with Jesus allowing him [to allow us] to get to know God better and bask in His loving arms.

Taking Some Time off From Our Everyday Life

Often, we need to take some time off from our everyday life to be able to re-focus our lives. Getting rid of the superfluous, entering into the desert where there are no distractions, focusing more on the needs of others than our own, finding more time for our personal prayer, are all things that help us grow into what should really matter in our lives. No wonder Jesus chose to take his friends up on the mountain away from everything, to make them see who He really was.

THE CONSUL GENERAL OF THE REPUBLIC OF MALTA TO CANADA WELCOMES YOUTH WHO WINS SCHOLARSHIP ON MALTESE CANADIAN MIGRATION

Maltese Canadian history has been a story of a humble people who left a tiny country in the Mediterranean – The Maltese Islands and became a success story thousands of kilometers away in the second largest country in the world - Canada. This story is the history, heritage and identity of 147,000 Maltese Canadians being preserved, unveiled and transmitted to future generations by a commendable initiative of the board of Leħen Malti TV in Canada led by Chairperson Joe Sherri by means of a scholarship offered to Maltese Canadian youths.

The Consul General of the Republic of Malta to Canada, Dr Raymond C. Xerri welcomed the winner of this scholarship, Maltese Canadian youth Nigel Klemenčič-Puglisevich at the Consulate General in Toronto, Ontario.



Consul General Dr Xerri congratulated Mr Klemenčič-Puglisevich for his work and promised the Consulate General's assistance in continuing his research into the Maltese Canadian story and also making available specialised research from the Maltese Canadian Library at the Consulate. Consul General Xerri provided Mr Klemenčič-Puglisevich with copies of important publications related to the third and fourth Conventions for Maltese Living Abroad, organised in 2000 and 2015 respectively.

St. Paul the Apostle Parish

Windsor

Malta United Society of Windsor, Ontario

On Good Friday, April 2nd, the club will hold a ravioli dinner. Doors will open at 5:00 p.m. and dinner will be served beginning at 6:00. There is a limit of 30 persons in the building at any one time, only four to a table and they must be from the same household. Takeout orders will be available.

In the first four months of 1920 more than 3.000 Maltese had applied for passports stating that their destination was the United States. At the time the only real prerequisites were good health and clean conduct and, if the applicants had enough money to pay their fare, then there was no great obstacle barring their entry. Problems arose in 1921 when the American Congress, under pressure from organized anti-immigration lobbies, put a check on the free entry of aliens. On May 19th, President Warren G. Harding approved the First Quota Law, also known as the Provisional Immigration Measure, which limited the number of immigrants to 3% of the total foreign-born persons permanently settled in the US in 1910. Since the Maltese population in that country prior to 1910 was miniscule, the flow of emigration from Malta to the US was reduced to a trickle. (Adapted from Fr. Lawrence E. RAVJUL TAL-IRKOTTA BIZ-ZALZA (RICOTTA RAVIOLI WITH SAUCE)



Lisa's Maltese recipes have appeared regularly in this newsletter since July 2020. Her recipe for figolli appeared in the March issue.

No matter where you are on this great big planet of ours, some form of ravioli exists. Ravioli is a multicultural dish that spans the globe. It is said to have originated in Italy, first appearing in Venice and Rome during the mid-fourteenth century. It is also reported that England had a version called rauiole. Wow, that's a lot of vowels! Sicilian ravioli and Maltese ravjul, however, may be older still. In Turkey, manti is a popular dish. It is stuffed with spiced meat and served with paprika sauce and yogurt. Similar dishes in China are the jiaozi or wonton. In India, a popular sweet dish called gujiya is prepared with a filling of dry fruits, sugar, and sweet spices. Jewish cuisine has a dish called kreplach served in chicken broth. Ravioli can be deep fried, simmered in broth, baked or boiled and served with butter, broth or sauce. We may never know who really invented ravioli first, but no matter how you make them or what you call them, these little packets of joy are the perfect comfort food in any cuisine.

Unlike the smaller square Italian ravioli, Maltese *ravjul* are large and round. Ravioli can be stuffed with many fillings like cheese, meat, seafood, herbs, vegetables or mushrooms. Maltese *ravjul* are typically stuffed with ricotta or *gbejna*, a locally produced sheep's milk cheese.

Ravjul is one of those dishes that invokes many childhood memories for me. I happily spent many a time with my mother and sisters gathered around the kitchen table making ravjul together. Growing up, I would always get excited when my mom said she was making them. It was usually for a special occasion. To this day, *ravjul* is still one of my favorites. I make them every Easter and it has become one of my family's Easter traditions.

This recipe will yield two dozen *ravjul*. It is my mother's recipe, who learned it from her mother, and so on. I would like to share it with you. I hope you enjoy it.

INGREDIENTS: FOR THE DOUGH:

- 2 cups all-purpose flour, sifted
- 1 large egg, beaten **OR** 1 cup semolina flour
- ¼ tsp. table salt
- ¼ cup water, or just enough to bring the dough together. If using semolina instead of the egg, you may need more water.



FOR THE FILLING:

- 1 lb. ricotta cheese
- 2 large eggs
- ¼ cup grated parmesan cheese
- 1 Tbs. finely minced parsley
- 1/4 tsp. table salt



FOR THE TOMATO SAUCE:

- 1-12 oz. can tomato paste
- 3 cups water
- ¹/₄ cup olive oil
- 6 cloves garlic, sliced
- 1 tsp. salt
- ½ tsp. pepper



INSTRUCTIONS:

The day before you make the *ravjul*, place the ricotta in a strainer over a bowl, cover with plastic wrap and store in the refrigerator to drain any excess whey. You don't want a soggy filling. You can also prepare your dough the day before as well.



FOR THE DOUGH:

- 1. Measure out all your ingredients. Sift the flour. Beat the egg.
- 2. Place the flour, salt and egg in a food processor and pulse until combined. Slowly pour in the water and process until it comes together in a ball. You may not need all the water. If you don't have a food processor, mix the dough by hand on your table or in a bowl by simply combining all the dry ingredients, forming a well in the middle for the eggs. Starting in the center, mix the flour in with the egg until combined. Add water as needed.



3. Roll the dough into a ball. Cover with plastic wrap and let it rest for 1 hour at room temperature.

FOR THE FILLING:

- 1. Retrieve the ricotta from the refrigerator and discard the whey.
- 2. Beat the eggs in a separate bowl to avoid getting any shells in the cheese.
- 3. Combine all the filling ingredients in a larger bowl and mix until well incorporated.



FOR THE TOMATO SAUCE:

- 1. Slice the garlic cloves
- 2. Heat the olive oil over medium heat and add the garlic slices. Cook until caramelized and golden brown.



- 3. Immediately add the tomato paste and stir to incorporate with the garlic. Let it cook for a minute or two to soften.
- 4. Slowly add the water while stirring to a smooth texture.
- 5. Add the salt and pepper.
- 6. Adjust seasoning as needed. You may need a little sugar to balance out the acidity.
- 7. Simmer on low for 20 minutes.

ASSEMBLY:

- 1. If you refrigerated your dough, bring it back to room temperature.
- 2. Divide the dough in half to make two batches. Work with one batch at a time.

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3. Form a 6-inch oblong shape. FYI, you will use your scraps to make a 3rd batch.



4. Using a rolling pin, roll the dough out to about a 36-inch length. It should be thin but not so thin that you can see through it.





5. You can also use a pasta machine to roll out your dough. If using a machine, divide your dough into four equal pieces. Starting on the thickest setting, roll the dough. Fold the dough into itself; lower the pasta machine down to the next setting. Repeat 2-3 times lowering the setting each time until you get to setting #3. I've found anything thinner than that makes the *ravjul* too fragile and they break apart in the boiling water.



6. Once the pasta is rolled out, lightly brush it with water. The water acts as a glue to seal the *ravjul*.



 Dollop a heaping tablespoon of filling about every two inches down the center of the dough.



8. Fold the dough over the filling.



9. Press the dough around the filling. Avoid trapping air bubbles.



 Using a cookie cutter, a glass, or any other round form like a clean tuna can, cut out your *ravjul* using a twisting motion. My mom always used a mug, so that's what I use.



- 11. Pull the scraps away from the *ravjul* and save for another batch.
- 12. Press around the edges to insure a tight seal.



13. Place on a well-floured baking sheet. You can cook them now or place in the freezer uncovered. Once frozen, store in freezer bags for future use.



- 14. Repeat steps 4-13 until all the dough is used up. If you have extra dough, don't waste it. Make some noodles.
- 15. Bring a large pot of well salted water to a rapid boil. Reduce heat to a gentle simmer.

Fresh pasta is fragile and will tear apart if the water is boiling aggressively.

COOK'S TIP: Place an upside-down saucer in the bottom of the pot. This will help control the boil and protect the delicate *ravjul*.

16. Drop in the *ravjul* one at a time.



Resist the temptation to stir it unnecessarily as the pasta may break apart. Gently stir **ONLY** if needed to prevent them from sticking together or to the bottom of the pot.

17. When they float, cook another 3-4 minutes. Total time in the water should be around 6-8 minutes.



- 18. Transfer to a colander with a large slotted spoon when fully cooked.
- 19. Serve with tomato sauce. Top with grated cheese. Garnish with parsley and dig in!



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THE INTERESTING STORY OF SALVATORE CACHIA

In his account of don Ángel Sierra (Angelo Fidele Serra) in the September 2020 issue of this newsletter, César made a brief reference to don Salvador Caquias (Salvatore Cachia)

The presence of the Caquias surname in Puerto Rico begins with the arrival, around 1792, of Salvatore Cachia, a native of the island of Malta. Salvatore was the son of Giuseppe Cachia and Therese Bonfi. By 1792, Marcello Mallia, a native of Ghaxaq in Malta, owned a ship and his partner was Salvatore Cachia. They had a good relationship until they arrived in Martinique. Their relationship deteriorated to the point that Marcello said of Salvatore that "he is not a man, and no one can be with him unless he be the devil."

Marcello and Salvatore parted ways when they arrived in Puerto Rico. Marcello continued his journey while Salvatore established his residence in Puerto Rico. By staying in Puerto Rico, Salvatore had better luck than Marcello since the latter suffered many vicissitudes as he continued his journey to Florida. He was taken prisoner by the English, lost his ship and everything he had. Marcello ended up in New York with the desire to return to Malta. Nevertheless, he was grateful to God for having given him the opportunity to see the world.

All this we have learned from a letter Marcello wrote from New York in 1797 to his parents in Għaxaq, Malta.

As for Salvatore, by staying in Puerto Rico he may have benefited from the Royal Decree of 1778. For many years the Spanish Crown promoted European immigration to Puerto Rico to try to develop the island's economy. The purpose was to bring in white Europeans with their capital, slaves, and technical knowledge to transform the economy from cattle ranches to large farm plantations. The Royal Decree of 1778 encouraged colonists with capital to begin the plantation of sugarcane on the island and the development of a society of agricultural landowners. Salvatore joined the Peñuelas society and became a successful merchant. The name of Salvatore Cachia was Spanishized to don Salvador Caguias.

Don Salvador married around 1800 with doña María Valentina Planas Rodríguez, daughter of the Mallorcan don Santiago Planas and doña María Candelaria Rodríguez. Don Salvador was naturalized on April 4, 1816, under the auspices of the Royal Decree of 1815.

An important aspect of the Royal Decree of 1815 was that It granted an entry and establishment

license not only to foreigners who were to move to Puerto Rico, but also to foreigners who already resided on the island. These foreigners would also be granted land free of charge and in perpetuity. Don Salvador probably benefited from this land distribution, which helped him increase his land holdings. It should be noted that another important benefit for Don Salvador was that his naturalization allowed him to integrate and participate fully, with all the rights of a citizen, in commercial and political affairs.

By 1824 Don Salvador Caquias was listed as an "associate" in the tax assessment documents. This associate position must have been important, as he worked alongside the mayor in developing the tax assessment for the town.

Studying the distribution tax assessments for the town of Peñuelas allows us to determine who were the largest landowners and businessmen in town. Tax assessments also tell us in which neighborhoods the properties were located. Based on these tax assessments, we can conclude that Don Salvador owned land in the Jaguas neighborhood of Peñuelas. The amount of taxes paid by Don Salvador was substantially more than the other taxpayers.

Based on my research, I estimate that the majority of Peñuelas' capital was concentrated in a small nucleus of families that were linked to the social and political life of the town. During 1818-1836, Don Salvador Caquias was one of the largest landowners of Peñuelas and certainly part of that elite.

He and his wife Doña María Valentina had the following children:

- 1. **Eduardo**, married in Peñuelas on May 10, 1837, with María Juliana Manriquez, daughter of Don Felipe and Doña María.
- Pedro José, married in Peñuelas on January 7, 1827, with Estefanía Zambrano Lugo, daughter of Don. Jacinto and Doña Jacinta de Lugo. I have found the following children:
 - a. Valentina (Eugenia), married in Peñuelas on April 3, 1879 with her second cousin Francisco José Sierra Rodríguez. They had a third degree of consanguinity.
 - b. **Isaias**, was married to Rosa Sierra Guey.
- 3. Juan Francisco, died in Peñuelas on February 6, 1843.
- 4. **María Candelaria**, married in Peñuelas on February 18, 1817, with Claudio Bartolomé Grivet Bernaut, a native of Orleans, France and son of Don Claudio and Doña María Teresa.
- 5. **Petronila**, married in Peñuelas on August 20, 1826, with **Juan Tomás de Silva**, his parents

were natives of Spain. I have found this daughter:

- a. **Nicolasa de Silva**, married in Peñuelas on June 9, 1849, with Juan Bautista Bula Sierra, son of Don Antonio and Doña. Estefanía Sierra.
- Juan Evangelista, married in Peñuelas on November 25, 1838, with Antonia María Sierra Planas, his first cousin and daughter of Don Ángel Sierra Portelli and Doña. María Eugenia Planas Rodríguez. Don Ángel was also from Malta. Juan Evangelista died in Peñuelas on September 2, 1854. He had the following children:
 - a. **María Fotunata**, was born in Peñuelas on November 21, 1841, and his godparents were Don Ángel Sierra and Doña Antonia Sierra. She was married to Don Nicolás Maldonado. She died in Peñuelas on October 29, 1868.
 - b. **Teodora del Carmen,** was born in Peñuelas on July 15, 1843, and her godparents were Don Juan Evangelista Sierra and Doña Francisca Pérez. (They were her maternal uncle and aunt respectively).
 - c. **Úrsula,** was born in Peñuelas on October 19, 1845, and her godparents were Don Pedro José Caquias and Doña Estefanía Zambrano (her paternal uncle and aunt).
 - d. **Emilia Enriqueta**, was born in Peñuelas on May 3, 1850, and her godparents were Don Juan Bautista Arenas and Doña María de los Santos Sierra (her maternal uncle and aunt).
- José Agustín, married in Peñuelas on July 5, 1832, with Concepción Irizarry Correa, daughter of Don Joaquín and Doña María. She died in Peñuelas on December 9, 1887. I have found a daughter named:
 - Valentina, she was married to Julio Sierra Pérez, and died in Peñuelas on December 5, 1890. They were second cousins.
- 8. **Francisco Bruno**, married in Peñuelas on February 15, 1844, with Rosa Martínez, natural daughter of Doña Inés. He died in Peñuelas on April 22, 1889. I found at least one son named Juan.

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- 9. **Juana**, appeared on the death certificate of Don Salvador and Dona Valentina, but I have not found any more information.
- Andrés, appeared on the death certificate of Don Salvador and Doña Valentina. No further information has been found.

Don Salvador died in Peñuelas on January 24, 1836. His death certificate is in the San José of Peñuelas Parish Archive, Funeral Book Six, page 225v and reads as follows:

In the year of the Lord of one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six, the twenty-fourth day of the month of January: I the Bdo. D. Juan Guillermo Jordán, Rector priest by His Majesty of this parish of San José of Peñuelas, gave ecclesiastical burial in the first section of the cemetery with a double burial ceremony with? the corpse of D. Salvador Caquias of seventy-six years of age, a native of the island of Malta, and legitimate son of D. José and D. Teresa Bonfa, was married to D. Valentina Planas; from whom they procreated María Candelaria, Petronila, Andrés, José Agustin, Pedro José, Juan

Evangelista, Juan Francisco., Eduardo, Teresa, and Francisco. Bruno, white and from this neighborhood; received the sacraments of Penance and Extreme Unction, made his Extrajudicial testament at the Aguas Blancas site, jurisdiction of Peñuelas, on the twentieth day of the month of January of this year, in which he ordered his burial, as stated above, that a mass be sung to the Holy Spirit and the following prayed, two to Saint Raphael, one to the guardian angel, another to the saint of his name and the three masses for his soul, that the Jerusalem duties be given a half real (this was the currency) to each one, and the religious pious orders the three designated pesos; that his fifth be given to his son Juan Francisco and María Isabel. And to comply with and pay for all the provisions, he appointed as executors, in first place his wife D. Valentina Planas, and second his son José Agustín, and his wife as guardian of the minors, and his son José Agustín as guardian of his grandchildren, and for accountant to the same José Agustín and Pedro José, of which I faithfully affirm. = Juan Guillermo Jordán.

Partial entry of the death of Don Salvador Caquias

His wife, Doña Valentina, died in Peñuelas on December 28, 1837. Her death certificate is in the San José de Peñuelas Parish Archive, Sixth Death Book, folio 384 and reads as follows:

In the year one thousand eight hundred thirtyseven, the twenty-eighth day of the month of December: I the Bdo. D. Juan Guillermo Jordán, Rector priest for His Majesty of this parish of San José of Peñuelas, gave ecclesiastical burial in the first section of the cemetery with a double ceremony to the corpse of D. María Valentina Planas, of about sixty years of age, legitimate daughter. D. Santiago and D. María Candelaria Rodríguez, deceased, received the sacraments of penance and extreme unction, made an extrajudicial testament at the Aguas Blancas site of this jurisdiction on the twelfth day of October of last year thirty-six, with which she arranged her burial as stated here: that a mass be sung to the Holy Spirit, and the following are prayed, two to Saint Raphael, one to the guardian angel, another to the saint of her name, three masses for her soul, to the Jerusalem duties, half a real to each one and to the religious pious duties the three designated pesos, that the remainder of the fifth be distributed among her children Juan Francisco, Teresa, and Bruno, that her daughter María Ysabel be given twenty-five pesos, that her granddaughter Nicolasa be given the same, that to the three children be given the fifth. She was the widow of D. Salvador Caguias from whom the married couple procreated María Candelaria, Andrés, José Agustín, Pedro José, Juan Evangelista, Juan Francisco,

Petronila, Eduardo, Teresa and Francisco Bruno as their legitimate children, whites from this population. And she named his sons José Agustín and Pedro José as executors, and their accountants, and as guardians of the minor children and grandchildren the two said sons and Don Claudio Gui? Ot, of which I attest. = Juan Guillermo Jordán.

Conclusion

The life of Salvatore Cachia is very interesting. One of the European immigrants who contributed to our mix of Natives, Africans, and Europeans. Although we do not know about his life on the island of Malta, it is very interesting the way he came to Puerto Rico. Did Salvatore Cachia and Marcello Mallia engage in smuggling in the Caribbean, as it was so prevalent at that time, and is that why they visited Puerto Rico? Or had they just arrived in America in search of fortune and adventure? Was it by chance or fate that Salvatore ended up in Puerto Rico? So, it seems. A disagreement with his partner left him in Puerto Rico and he decided to make his life in Peñuelas. He joined the Peñuelas society, became naturalized in 1816, and became one of the largest landowners in that town. He left behind numerous descendants and the surname Caquías still abounds in Puerto Rico. I hope that in the future we can find more information about his youth on the island of Malta.






