PASTOR'S THOUGHTS...



Fr. Mario Micallef, M SSP, is pastor of St. Paul the Apostle, Toronto, the only Maltese national parish in North America. These "Pastor's thoughts..." are extracts from his commentaries on the Sunday readings which are published in the Parish's Sunday Bulletin.

Distractions Have to Be Cleared Away

....We have to straighten our paths so that we can be able to see clearly. Distractions have to be cleared away. The Word will help us to fill our emptiness, the void in our lives, so that we can truly live a full life....The true meaning of conversion is to return to the right place, to where you belong.

....The Word which took flesh in Bethlehem is the word which enlightens our path.

Our God Is Truly the Emmanuel

Sometimes we might find ourselves in the same situation as the people of John [the Baptist]'s time, We might have and be blessed with a lot of things in life. But still, we feel that there is something missing in our lives. Perhaps the crucial question, before asking what I should be doing, is, "What am I looking for? What do I really want in life?" I suspect that if we were to make a list of what we really want, joy or happiness would be somewhere at the top of that list. When you think about it, most of the stuff we do, we do it because we want joy. It's amazing how many people seem to have everything and yet lack true joy.

One person came into the world with the promise of joy. At His birth in Bethlehem, this is what the messengers from heaven sang; "Joy to the world." No one, no race, is excepted from this. The message of joy is for everyone....

John the Baptist's message [Lk. 3:10-14] is as relevant today as it was to his people back then. Helping others with what we have been given is a

constant in Jesus' teaching and life. He preached it, and He lived it. He constantly gave of Himself, until He reached the climax on the cross. This is the paradox of Christianity. Using the words of the great spiritual writer Ron Rolheiser, "As the Prayer of St. Francis puts it, we can never attain joy, consolation, peace, forgiveness, love, and understanding by actively pursuing them. We attain them by giving them out. That's the great paradox at the center of our spirituality."

The rest is relatively easy: just live what you are called to be....

The Son of God became human to give us life, joy and peace....The birth of Jesus is tangible proof that our God is not a far-away deity or ideal. He is truly the Emmanuel, the God-is-with-us."

Jesus Can Do Wonders in Our Lives

....we have Christmas once more to remind us that Jesus came into the midst of all this. He was born in poverty, lacking all basic securities. He came into a world full of turmoil and anxieties. As an unmarried mother, Mary had all her fears allayed as she allowed God to take over. Her song, the Magnificat, was one of praise, thanksgiving and joy. "The Almighty has done great things for me," she says, not allowing her humility to diminish God's powerful actions working in her.

We all have our moments of darkness, uncertainties, pains or problems in our lives. The story of Christmas tells us that Jesus is not embarrassed to enter into these realities. On the contrary, it is precisely in those stories that He wants to enter, to be re-born.

"Blessed is she who believed," Elizabeth said. Do we believe that Jesus can do wonders in our lives too, like He did in the lives of Mary and Elizabeth?

God Is with Us

....Not unlike, the world...[into which Jesus was born], our own world is far from perfect. Family problems, strained relationships, sicknesses and death and personal issues are all a reality in our world. And yet, the Jesus who was not afraid to enter into a broken world two thousand years ago, is not afraid to do so now. Whether it is in our troubled selves or in our divided home, Jesus comes to bring the same message of peace and hope, the story of Christmas says that God has not given up on us. It says God is with us, not over us, or judging us, or condemning us, or deserting us.

Fellow Maltese,

Despite the physical distance, and the time you have spent away from these Islands, you remain close to us both in thought and in our hearts.

I am therefore pleased to take this opportunity to share these few words with you and wish you and your loved ones good wishes at this very special time of year.

Perhaps few expected that the situation in 2021 will be very similar to that of 2020. I admit that, like many, I hope we find a speedy and lasting solution to overcome the adverse effects of the pandemic. It however seems that this virus will continue to pose challenges that will keep changing and will likely last for a long time.

I appeal to everyone to listen to the advice given to us by science and to follow more closely the advice of professionals, including precautionary measures, such as vaccinations.

I believe that international cooperation, especially between affluent and less affluent countries, is crucial for us as one global family to move forward. Despite the geographical distances between us, we all remain committed to achieving the 2030 Sustainability Goals and ensuring that we leave no one behind.

Without detracting from the medical emergency created due to this pandemic, I am optimistic about the new year and wish for a better balance between the health challenges and the protection of fundamental human rights.

I must mention all the workers in the medical field

and salute them for the determination and resilience they've shown over the last few months as they have continued to be heroes for us all.

Ladies and gentlemen,

As this year approaches its end, I am all the more convinced that the events that continue to shape our country cannot be viewed from an isolated perspective, but in a regional and international context.

The effects of climate change, the humanitarian emergency which is becoming serious in some parts of the world, and the levels of inequality between the northern and the southern countries, continue to sustain an unfair system that is causing harm to our planet.

The sale and trafficking of weapons, especially in war zones and countries fighting extremist forces, continue to hamper our collective efforts for peace and unity. I appeal for more countries to recognise the damage caused by militarising politics and to ensure that international law is used as a tool to safeguard fundamental rights and not as a weapon of extermination.

I welcome the COP26 climate emergency talks held in Glasgow a few weeks ago. Through dialogue and mutual respect, these discussions show an international family that, although embracing many political divergences, is ready to work together to find a solution.

It is this dialogue-based unity that paves the way for a positive and lasting change.

Through my Office, I have also worked hard to strengthen dialogue between different sections in Maltese society. Despite the restrictions, I am pleased to say that during 2021, I chaired several conferences addressing national unity from different aspects. The Conference for National Unity held in February, the Conference marking 100 Years Since the Granting of the Constitution in April, and the

Conference on the State of the Nation in June, were important initiatives that brought together many different organisations, experts, and academics.

I am pleased to share with you that preparations are currently underway so that in March 2022, together with the Albabtain Cultural Foundation, I will be organising the second World Forum for Culture of Peace. Through international participation, this forum will serve as an important platform for discussion and a global catalyst for further building a culture of peace.

I invite you to be part of the local discussion as well and, through various opportunities, to get closer to the current affairs of the Maltese islands and to kindle in the younger generations an interest and love for the Maltese culture and language.

I am very fond of the latter as it is the most living expression of our nation and it continues to serve us in the best way, despite outside influences and new technology. Few people can boast of a unique language that has continued to evolve over the years.

I understand that many people have suffered greatly

because they could not travel to Malta and experience the warm embraces and the joy of meeting family members. Although technology has eased the separation, a picture on the phone or computer can never replace human contact.

I hope that over the coming months travel between countries will still be permitted and that you will be able to visit our country without issues. I, too, hope to be able to resume my visits to the communities of Maltese living abroad. A few weeks ago, I had the pleasure of visiting Maltese patients receiving treatment in London and I also had the opportunity to meet several nuns and monks assisting them. These are heart-warming encounters, but they also instill hope and courage for a better future. As was the meeting I had with a good number of Maltese consultants in Surgery and Medicine holding high positions in the best hospitals in the United Kingdom. In conclusion, I want to once again wish you and your loved ones a Merry Christmas.

Above all, I wish you prosperity and health for a year full of happiness, peace, and love.






In the early part of November 2021, the Maltese-Canadian Museum/Archives at St. Paul the Apostle Church Complex received a collection of books





regarding learning the Maltese language. Most of the books are for learning basic Maltese. The benefactor of these books preferred to remain anonymous.

VISITS TO MALTESE CANADIAN BUSINESSES IN THE GTA

During the early part of December 2021, Dr. Raymond Xerri, the Consul General of Malta to Canada, was invited to two Maltese Canadian owned businesses in the Great Toronto Area (GTA).

John G. Borg is the president and CEO of KFL / EEE Logistics Solution Provider, a relatively new company which operates transportation routes throughout North America. KFL (Keene Freight Logistics) is situated on Britannia Road East in the heart of the Mississauga business hub.



Borg is no stranger to this business. His family conducted most of the transportation between Malta and Gozo for many decades in the last century and Borg himself has been involved in the transportation sector for the last quarter century.

VALETTA, ONTARIO

Have you ever heard of this place? I hadn't until a few days ago, and yet it's only some 132 km (82 miles) southwest of London, Ontario, where I live.

It is now but a locality, not even a hamlet, in the municipality of Chatham-Kent and some 8 km (5 miles) northwest of the small farming community of Merlin. Situated in about the centre of what was East Tilbury the township office appears to have been located there by the late 1870s.

At that time, it was the "principal village of the township" and had "200 inhabitants".

It is located at the intersection of Middle Line and

Depot and Valetta roads. The area "was settled by Scots, with some admixture of immigrants from the north of Ireland." Most were Presbyterians. They formed a congregation in 1846 and soon after constructed a log church. This was replaced by a frame building in 1862 and a brick structure in 1904. This building, known as Valetta Presbyterian Church, still stands on the north side of Middle Line and west of Valetta Road.

While this community was named after the city in Malta, why it was so-named is unknown. It is suspected, however, that the name may have been extended to the community with the assigning of a post office here with the same name in 1864. In any case, this post office ceased to exist in 1915 but the name for the community continued.

**MALTESE CANADIAN SINGER,
SONGWRITER AND BROADCASTER,
ENZO GUSMAN, DIES**

Enzo Gusman passed away peacefully at his home in Mississauga, Ontario, surrounded by his family, on Saturday, December 18, 2021. He was 74 years old.



Enzo suffered a near-fatal spinal cord injury in July 2020, which caused him to be hospitalized for nine months and left him a quadriplegic. He returned home in April 2021. It was complications from the spinal cord injury which ultimately caused his death.

Enzo was born in Sliema, Malta, on August 9, 1947. In 1960, at the age of 13, he took part in the Malta Song Festival held at the Radio City Opera House in Hamrun and transmitted on the now-defunct Malta's Cable Radio system run by Rediffusion. Enzo was to come first at this festival four times, in 1966, 1974, 1976 and 1995. He took part in other festivals and won in many, including Canzoni d'Oggi, Festival della Canzone Napoletana, Malta Song Festival, Malta Folk Festival and L-Għanja tal-Poplu. Discovered by Johnnie Navarro, the late Maltese comic, Enzo was invited as a resident singer on "Tic Tac," a program run by Rediffusion.

Educated at the Lyceum and the University of Malta, he joined Barclays Bank in 1965 and pursued a career in banking. He continued this after immigrating to Canada in 1979 with his wife, the former Carmen Schembri a well-known singer on the Maltese light music scene, and their two children, Johanna and Greta.

Meanwhile, having worked at Rediffusion in Malta as a disc-jockey, he also worked with CHIN Radio/TV, based in Toronto, after moving to the Greater Toronto Area. He was the first disc-jockey to include Maltese records on radio. Having volunteered his services to the Maltese-Canadian Society in Toronto, he was MC for its annual Miss Malta pageants.

On his temporary return to Xandir, Malta in 1991, Enzo worked at Bay Radio, PBS, Super One, Radio 101, NET TV and Calypso Radio.

As a singer, Enzo participated in several international song festivals, such as World Popular Song Festival, Tokyo, Japan; Festival Internacional De la Canción, Viña del Mar, Chile; Olympiad De La Chanson, Athens, Greece; Alexandria International Song Festival, Alexandria Egypt; Castlebar International Song Festival, Castlebar, Ireland; Cavan International Song Festival Cavan, Ireland; Istanbul International Song Festival, Istanbul, Turkey; Festival Menschen und meer Rostock, DDR; and Festival Golden Orpheus Slantchev Bryag, Bulgaria. His Major achievement was when he won the coveted First Prize at the Golden Orpheus Festival in Bulgaria. In Ireland, he was awarded the Best Foreign Artist at The Cavan International Song Festival, and in Turkey he was declared as the Best Interpreter in the Istanbul International Song Festival.

Enzo wrote and composed several of his own songs, many of which are still very popular in Malta

and in the Maltese Diaspora, such as “Fil-Pjazza tar-Raħal,” “Zepp u Grezz,” “Bis-Sewwa jew bid-Dnewwa,” “Zomm Idejk Fuqna,” “Għax Għadni Nħobbok,” “Telefonata mingħand il-Mulej,” “Illum il-Festa Tagħna” and “Aġhtini Pint’Oħra.”

In 2011 he was honoured on Republic Day (December 13th) with the *Midolja għall-Qadi tar-Repubblika* (Medal for Service to the Republic).

On August 7, 2021, during the festival *L-Għanja tal-Poplu*, Enzo was awarded a special recognition for his great contribution to the Malta music scene. During the festival, which was televised on Television (TVM), he delivered a short video-message from his recovery bed.




